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Note: This manual does not cover the forms to be used for amendments of Schedules 1 to 3 and 5 to the *Customs Tariff Act 1995* or the Schedule to the *Excise Tariff Act 1921*. The Customs Tariff Amending Forms Manual contains the forms to be used for amendments of the Schedule to the *Customs Tariff Act 1995*.

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Chapter 1—Legislation to amend or repeal Acts or instruments

The textual amendment system

1 Amendments of Commonwealth Acts or instruments are generally made using the textual amendment system. This system uses a “cut-and-paste” analogy. A principal Act or instrument is amended by direct amendments of the text. Later amending Acts or instruments then operate on a version of the principal Act or instrument that incorporates all the textual amendments that have previously been made.

2 The alternative method of amendment is non-textual amendment, often referred to as “legislation by reference” or “referential” amendment (see Chapter XIII of the Renton Report, “The Preparation of Legislation” Cmnd. 6053 (U.K.), and Thornton, *Legislative Drafting* (3rd ed, pp 127–131)). The amending Act or instrument changes the effect of the Act or instrument being amended without altering the text of that Act or instrument.

[The reference to Thornton is to be updated to the 5th edition when it is available.]

Choosing among several possible amendment approaches

3 The same end result can often be achieved using different amendment approaches. For example, the same amendment might be made either by replacing several words in a subsection, or by replacing the whole subsection. In choosing among the different approaches available, you should bear in mind the convenience of users of legislation, in particular members of Parliament, departmental officers and affected members of the public.

Schedules of amendments or repeals

General rules

4 Generally, all amendments and repeals are made by numbered items of a Schedule (except a repeal of all or part of an Act or instrument by that Act or instrument: see paragraph **Error! Reference source not found.**).

5 Schedules are numbered Schedule 1, Schedule 2 etc. Even if there is only one Schedule, it is called “Schedule 1”. Word Note 4 sets out additional requirements for Schedule headings.

6 The items in a Schedule are numbered consecutively, starting with 1 (even if there is only one item).

7 Non-amending items (for example, application, saving or transitional provisions) may be included in an amending/repealing Schedule to a Bill. Application, saving or transitional provisions that relate to an amendment of an instrument should be included, by amendment, in a separate Part or Chapter of the principal instrument to which they relate. Application, saving or transitional provisions that relate to an instrument that is being repealed, and is not being replaced by a new instrument, may be included in the repealing instrument. In this case, the repealing instrument should contain a sunset provision for the application, saving or transitional provisions (see paragraph 57).

8 Appendix 1A summarises the principles for the amendment forms used in amending items.

Examples of amendment forms

9 Appendix 1B contains examples of many of the situations likely to be encountered. The examples are not exhaustive. Drafters should discuss novel amending forms they propose to use with the editor before the Bill or instrument is sent for its first editorial check. If necessary, the editor and the drafter should raise the novel form with First Parliamentary Counsel.

“Activating” section for amending Schedules

10 The following form should be used for Bills, unless there is a special reason for not using it:

3 Schedules

Legislation that is specified in a Schedule to this Act is amended or repealed as set out in the applicable items in the Schedule concerned, and any other item in a Schedule to this Act has effect according to its terms.

11 The following form should be used for instruments, except for Court Rules and Ordinances, unless the instrument amends one or more Acts or the head drafter approves another form for a particular instrument:

4 Schedules

Each instrument that is specified in a Schedule to this instrument is amended or repealed as set out in the applicable items in the Schedule concerned, and any other item in a Schedule to this instrument has effect according to its terms.

12 The following form should be used for legislative instruments that amend one or more Acts, unless the head drafter approves another form for a particular instrument:

4 Schedules

Legislation that is specified in a Schedule to this instrument is amended or repealed as set out in the applicable items in the Schedule concerned, and any other item in a Schedule to this instrument has effect according to its terms.

13 The following form should be used for Court Rules:

4 Schedules

Each instrument that is specified in a Schedule to these Rules is amended or repealed as set out in the applicable items in the Schedule concerned, and any other item in a Schedule to these Rules has effect according to its terms.

14 The following form should be used for Ordinances:

4 Schedules

Each instrument that is specified in a Schedule to this Ordinance is amended or repealed as set out in the applicable items in the Schedule concerned, and any other item in a Schedule to this Ordinance has effect according to its terms.

15 The standard form should be used for an amending Bill or instrument even if the Bill or instrument has only one Schedule, amends only one Act or instrument or has only one amending item.

16 The section heading is the same whether the Bill or instrument has only one Schedule or has more than one Schedule.

17 The reference to any other item having effect “according to its terms” covers any non-amending items (for example, application, saving or transitional provisions) in an amending Schedule in a Bill.

18 If the remainder of the Act or instrument (apart from the activating section) has a single commencement time, the activating section should also commence at that time. Otherwise, the activating section should commence at the same time as the citation or name section.

Notes to amending items in instruments

19 A note to an amending item may be included in an instrument only if it is clear that the inclusion of the note would not prevent the automatic repeal of the instrument under Division 1 of Part 3 of Chapter 3 of the *Legislation Act 2003*.

No page breaks within inserted blocks

20 The normal rules about starting Chapters, Parts, Schedules etc. on a new page do not apply within a block of text that is to be included in a principal Act or instrument.

Order and grouping of amendments

21 There are various ways of grouping amending items in an amending Bill or instrument. These include:

- (a) A single amending Schedule that amends only one Act or instrument, with the items arranged according to the order of the amended provisions.
- (b) A single amending Schedule that amends several Acts or instruments. The amended Acts or instruments are in alphabetical order, and the items for each amended Act or instrument are in the order of the amended provisions.
- (c) Several amending Schedules that amend one or more Acts or instruments, grouped according to the subject matter of the amendments or by commencement dates.

22 Care should be taken if the same provision of a principal Act or instrument is being amended for different purposes and the amendments are to commence on the same day. In this case, the amendments should generally be expressed to commence in sequence, with each amendment in the sequence commencing immediately after the previous one.

Consequential amendments arising from new principal Act or instrument

23 The enactment of a new principal Act or instrument can result in consequential amendments having to be made to other Acts or instruments.

24 If a new principal Act is to be enacted, any consequential amendments, together with any application, saving or transitional provisions that are required, are usually included in a separate Bill. Any consequential repeals of other Acts are also included in the separate Bill. The approval of First Parliamentary Counsel is required to include consequential amendments or repeals in a Bill for a new principal Act.

25 If a new principal instrument is to be made:

- (a) Any consequential amendments that are required should be included in a separate amending instrument. The approval of the head drafter is required to include any consequential amendments in a new principal instrument.
- (b) Any application, saving or transitional provisions that are required should be included in a separate Part or Chapter at the end of the new principal instrument.
- (c) Any consequential repeals of other instruments that are required should be included in an amending Schedule to the new principal instrument, unless there is another instrument including consequential amendments, in which case any consequential repeals should be included in a separate Schedule or Part to that instrument. If a repeal is included in an amending Schedule to a new principal instrument, the activating section set out above must also be included in the new principal instrument.

Application, saving and transitional provisions

26 Application, saving and transitional provisions should not be included in the introductory provisions of an amending Bill. However, provisions relating to the amendment of assessments may be included in the introductory provisions of Tax Laws Amendment Bills.

27 Application, saving and transitional provisions may be included in an amending or repealing Bill:

- (a) as separate items after the relevant amendment or repeal; or
- (b) at the end of the Schedule, Part or Division containing the relevant amendments or repeal; or
- (c) in a separate Schedule, Part or Division.

28 Choosing which option depends on how many provisions there are and how many amendments or repeals the provisions relate to.

29 Application, saving and transitional provisions relating to amendments of some Acts should be included, by amendment, in the Act being amended or in another Act (other than the Act being amended). This is often the case if the Act being amended relies on references

of power from the States. For some other Acts, there is a drafting convention about location of these kinds of provisions. The Drafting Note called “Special issues for amending particular Acts” deals with some of these Acts.

30 Application, saving and transitional provisions relating to amendments of instruments are to be included, by amendment, in a separate Part or Chapter at the end of the relevant instrument being amended. Application, saving or transitional provisions that relate to an instrument that is being repealed, and is not being replaced by a new instrument, may be included in the repealing instrument. In this case, the repealing instrument should contain a sunset provision for the application, saving or transitional provisions (see paragraph 57).

31 Some existing principal instruments have been set up to include application, saving and transitional provisions in a non-amending Schedule to the instrument. A separate Part is added to the non-amending Schedule for each new amending instrument to contain the application, saving and transitional provisions related to amendments made by the amending instrument. (For example, see Schedule 13 to the *Migration Regulations 1994*.) For the amending instruction when adding Parts to these Schedules, see the example in Subpart C2A.

32 Word Note 4 sets out formatting rules applying to application, saving and transitional provisions included in amending Schedules of Bills.

Tables of contents for amending Bills or instruments

33 Where a Schedule amends 2 or more Acts or instruments, the table of contents that is generated automatically will list all Acts or instruments amended by the Schedule (if the correct style has been used for the Act or instrument names). This list should be retained in the table of contents.

34 Similarly, a properly formatted repealing Schedule will result in a table of contents listing the Acts or instruments repealed. Again, this list should be retained.

Identifying the “owner” of subsection headings, notes and examples

Subsection headings

35 A subsection heading is to be treated as part of the subsection that immediately follows, even if the heading also relates to later subsections. If a subsection with a heading is repealed, then the heading will also disappear. This means that:

- (a) if you want to replace a subsection but you want to keep the heading, you will need to include the heading with the substituted subsection; and
- (b) if you want to remove a subsection but you want to keep the heading because it still applies to succeeding subsections, you will need to say this expressly in the amending form (e.g. “repeal the subsection (not including the heading)”).

Notes and examples

36 A note or example at the foot of a subsection (other than the last subsection in a section) is to be treated as part of the subsection. If you wish to repeal the subsection, but retain the note or example, use the following form “Repeal the subsection (not including the note/example)”.

37 A note or example at the foot of the last subsection in a section is to be treated as follows:

- (a) if it clearly relates only to the last subsection, treat it as part of the last subsection;
- (b) if it clearly relates to more than the last subsection, treat it as part of the section;
- (c) in other cases, clarify the intended effect of the amendment, even if this involves modifying the amending form (e.g. “repeal the subsection (not including the note/including the note)”).

38 A note or example at the foot of a paragraph (other than the last paragraph in a subsection) is to be treated as part of the paragraph. If you wish to repeal the paragraph, but retain the note or example, use the following form “Repeal the paragraph (not including the note/example)”.

39 A note or example at the foot of the last paragraph in a subsection is to be treated as follows:

- (a) if it clearly relates only to the last paragraph, treat it as part of the last paragraph;
- (b) if it clearly relates to the subsection, treat it as part of the subsection;
- (c) in other cases, clarify the intended effect of the amendment, even if this involves modifying the amending form (e.g. “repeal the paragraph (not including the note/including the note)”).

40 If you repeal one or more notes or examples from a provision so that only one note or example remains, you should also amend that note or example to omit the note or example number. Similarly, if you add one or more notes or examples after a single note or example, you should renumber the existing note or example as Note 1 or Example 1.

41 A note under a non-amending Schedule heading referring to the operative provision supporting the Schedule may be amended without amending the Schedule heading itself. The amending item heading should refer to the Schedule number and be followed by “(note to Schedule heading)”. This form is to be used even if the word “Note” does not appear in the actual note under the Schedule heading.

Penalties

42 A penalty at the foot of a subsection (other than the last subsection) is to be treated as part of the subsection. A penalty at the foot of the last subsection that clearly relates to that subsection is to be treated as part of that subsection. If it not clear whether a penalty at the foot of the last subsection relates to that subsection only, it will be necessary to clarify the intended effect of the amendment (e.g. “repeal the subsection (including the penalty)”). If the penalty related to any other remaining subsections in the section, amendments to add the penalty at the foot of those subsections will also be needed.

Common things that need to be checked

43 The following are some of the things you should check when drafting an amending Bill or instrument:

- (a) Check that the correct material is omitted or inserted.
- (b) Consider whether any application, saving or transitional provisions are needed.
- (c) If more than one amendment is required to a section, subsection, paragraph etc., consider whether the matter would be more conveniently dealt with by remaking the unit of text in question. Remaking is particularly desirable if the amendments are extensive (however, it may be inadvisable to remake a provision that contains contentious matter).
- (d) If matter is to be repealed or omitted from an Act or instrument, definitions and interpretative provisions relating to words and expressions used only in that matter will also need to be repealed. Note that a definition that is no longer relevant for the Act or instrument in which it appears might sometimes still be needed because *another* Act or instrument relies on it. If so, the other Act or instrument should be amended to include the substance of the definition.
- (e) Consider whether the amendments require a consequential change to any headings or simplified outlines in the amended Act or instrument, or to the long title (for an amended Act).
- (f) Consider whether there are any uncommenced or proposed amendments that clash with or affect the provisions of the principal Act or instrument being amended.
- (g) Consider whether the provisions being amended no longer apply or will sunset in the future.

Checking cross-references

44 If a provision of a principal Act or instrument is being amended or repealed, you should check cross-references to the provision and make any necessary consequential amendments. If the provision being amended or repealed was inserted into the principal Act or instrument by a previous amending Act or instrument, the previous amending Act or instrument might indicate other provisions that could be affected. It might also indicate the need for application, saving or transitional provisions. Similarly, if the name of an Act or instrument is being changed, you should check references to the Act or instrument and make any necessary consequential amendments.

Acts amending instruments

45 Acts should not amend regulations or other instruments except for compelling reasons. One such compelling reason would be the need to amend a legislative instrument retrospectively in a way that adversely affects a person's rights or imposes new liabilities.

Subsection 12(2) of the *Legislation Act 2003* prevents a retrospective provision of a legislative or notifiable instrument from applying to a person if the provision adversely affects the person's rights or imposes new liabilities. Another approach would be to amend the Act containing the legislative instrument-making power by expressly excluding the application of subsection 12(2) in relation to that power. However, the Senate Scrutiny of Bills Committee might comment adversely on this approach.

46 If it is decided that an Act must amend an instrument, you should take care to ensure that any amending instruments with suspended commencements will not affect the amendments to be made by the Act. In addition, you should notify the Principal Legislative Counsel of the amendments, and warn the instructing Agency that no amendments by instrument should be made that may affect the amendments to be made by the Act. It is also important to ensure that the instrument can be further amended or repealed by another instrument.

47 Drafting Direction 3.8 contains important information about the technical requirements for amending instruments by Acts.

Repeal of Acts and instruments

General

48 Repeals of Acts are to be included in a separate amending Schedule, Part or Division from amendments of Acts. Only items repealing Acts (and any associated application, saving or transitional provisions) are to be included in this Schedule, Part or Division.

49 Repeals of instruments that are consequent on the making of a new principal instrument should be included in an amending Schedule to the new principal instrument, unless there is another instrument including consequential amendments, in which case any consequential repeals should be included in a separate Schedule, or separate Part or Division of a Schedule, to that instrument. (An amending Schedule that is included in a new principal instrument, and that only repeals one or more instruments, will be automatically repealed under Division 1 of Part 3 of Chapter 3 of the *Legislation Act 2003*. The activating section for the amending Schedule will also generally be automatically repealed under that Division.) Other repeals of instruments (except multiple repeals of spent or redundant instruments) should be included in an amending Schedule, Part or Division of an amending instrument. Only items repealing instruments (and not consequential amendments) are to be included in this Schedule, Part or Division.

50 Multiple repeals of legislative instruments (for example, repeals of spent and redundant instruments) are to be made by a new principal instrument. The instruments to be repealed are included in tables in amending Schedules to the new principal instrument. A hyperlink is to be attached to the reference to the FRL identifier of each instrument being repealed. For example, see the *Attorney-General's (Spent and Redundant Instruments) Repeal Regulation 2013*.

51 When repealing an Act that has been amended by other Acts or instruments, the amending item should normally repeal only the principal Act concerned (and not the individual Acts or instruments that amended it). If the current name of the principal Act differs from its original name, the repealing item should specify the current name.

52 When repealing an instrument that has been amended by other instruments or Acts, the principal instrument, and any amending instruments that have not already been repealed, should be repealed, if practicable. If the current name of the principal instrument differs from its original name, the repealing item should specify the current name. If it is necessary to repeal an instrument that does not have a unique name equivalent to the short title of an Act, or a unique series number, then the instrument must be cited by:

- (a) its name (if any); and
- (b) its series number (if any); and
- (c) if the instrument is a legislative instrument—its FRL identifier; and
- (d) any additional information necessary to clearly identify the instrument (for example, the Act and provision under which the instrument was made and the date on which it was made).

See the example in Part A of Appendix 1A.

Repeal of amending provisions

53 Repealing an Act or instrument (or a part of an Act or instrument) that contains a provision amending another Act or instrument does not result in the amendment ceasing to have effect (because of section 7 of the *Acts Interpretation Act 1901*).

54 If you are repealing all the amending items included under an Act or instrument title at style heading (so there will be no amending items remaining under that heading), you must also repeal the heading.

Repeal of legislative instruments and provisions under Division 1 of Part 3 of Chapter 3 of the *Legislation Act 2003*

55 Division 1 of Part 3 of Chapter 3 of the *Legislation Act 2003* automatically repeals:

- (a) legislative instruments and provisions of legislative instruments if their only legal effect is to amend or repeal one or more legislative instruments; and
- (b) legislative instruments and provisions of legislative instruments that provide solely for the commencement of a legislative instrument or an Act, or the commencement of a provision of a legislative instrument or an Act.

56 Such instruments and provisions have no continuing operation or effect after the relevant amendment, repeal or commencement has taken effect.

57 Legislative instruments or provisions of legislative instruments that are not automatically repealed under Division 1 of Part 3 of Chapter 3 of the *Legislation Act 2003*, and that are spent or are no longer required, may be repealed by a regulation made under Division 2 of that Part. See, for example, the *Attorney-General's (Spent and Redundant Instruments) Repeal Regulation 2013*.

58 A repeal of a legislative instrument or provision of a legislative instrument under Part 3 of Chapter 3 of the *Legislation Act 2003* does not:

- (a) undo the instrument's effect (see section 7 of the *Acts Interpretation Act 1901*); or
- (b) remove the requirements to lodge the instrument for registration on FRL and to table the instrument in each House of Parliament; or
- (c) prevent a House of the Parliament from disallowing the instrument.

Sunset provisions

59 Drafting Direction 2.2 sets out the issues to consider in choosing whether to repeal an Act or instrument, or a provision of an Act or instrument, or provide that the Act, instrument or provision ceases to be in force. If an Act or instrument, or a provision of an Act or instrument, is to have a finite life by being repealed, the form to be used is:

777 Repeal of this [Act/instrument/section]

This [Act/instrument/section] is repealed at the start of [date].

Instruments replaced due to sunseting

60 If you are drafting a new instrument to replace an existing instrument that sunsets on a particular day, you should explicitly repeal the existing instrument. This is the case even if that instrument is due to sunset on or before the date the new instrument is to commence. Explicitly repealing the existing instrument is clearer for users and also avoids problems that may arise if the sunset date turns out to have been incorrectly calculated.

Instruments not in OPC styles

61 If you are amending a billable instrument that is not formatted using OPC styles, and you think that it is not appropriate to apply the OPC standard amending forms, you should discuss this with the head drafter.

62 Likewise, if you are amending any other instrument, or an Act, that is not formatted using OPC styles, and you think a departure from the OPC standard amending forms is warranted, you should discuss this with the head drafter.

Appendix 1A—Amendment forms (general principles)

63 This Appendix sets out the general principles for the amendment forms to be used when amending Acts or instruments. This Appendix has a small number of examples that help to explain the general principles.

64 A fuller set of examples is in Appendix 1B, which covers most of the commonly used forms.

A. Repealing or omitting

65 The “repeal” form is used to repeal whole Acts or instruments or whole units of Acts or instruments. Examples of units are a Chapter, Part, Division, section, paragraph, note, penalty, table, table item or table cell. The omit form is used for words that do not amount to a whole unit. The effect of this distinction is that an amending form that ends with the words “... the [name of unit].” will always use the repeal form. Otherwise, the “omit” form is used.

A1. Repealing an Act or instrument

66 There are 2 options for repealing Acts and instruments. The first option is to use a separate amending item (and Act or instrument heading) for each Act or instrument that is to be repealed, in accordance with the following examples. The second option is to use the multiple amendment format outlined in Subpart L3.

XYZ Act 1990

777 The whole of the Act

Repeal the Act.

TUV Regulation 2013

777 The whole of the regulation

Repeal the regulation.

Proclamation made on 3 October 2002 under subsection 390D(1) of the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (Federal Register of Legislation No. F2007B00734)

777 The whole of the Proclamation

Repeal the Proclamation.

A2. Repealing a unit

67 The item heading identifies the unit to be repealed. The action line takes the form “Repeal the [name of unit]”.

777 Division 3 of Part 5

Repeal the Division.

[In Acts or instruments with unique Division numbering (e.g. the Aged Care Act 1997 and the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997), it is not necessary to refer to the Part number in the amending item heading.]

777 Subsection 200(4) (subparagraph (b)(ii) of the definition of *animal*)

Repeal the subparagraph.

777 Regulation 4C

Repeal the regulation.

A3. Omitting words

68 The item heading identifies the affected unit. The action line identifies the words to be omitted, by quoting them or otherwise identifying them.

777 Subsection 200(4) (definition of *animal*)

Omit “frog”.

777 Subsection 200(4) (definition of *animal*)

Omit all the words from and including “frog” to and including “pond”.

B. Substituting

69 This consists of a repeal or omission of text, and its replacement with new text. It is simply an extension of the repeal/omission forms. The replacement text may consist of a unit, some words or a combination of both.

777 Division 3 of Part 6

Repeal the Division, substitute:

[text of new Division]

[In Acts or instruments with unique Division numbering (e.g. the Aged Care Act 1997 and the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997), it is not necessary to refer to the Part number in the amending item heading.]

777 Subsection 200(4) (paragraph (b) of the definition of animal)

Repeal the paragraph, substitute:

[text of new paragraph]

777 Subsection 200(4) (definition of animal)

Omit “frog”, substitute “toad”.

777 Subsection 200(4)

Omit all the words after “Deputy”, substitute:

Commissioner must notify:

- (a) the responsible authority for the State; and
- (b) each person who received a copy of the original summons.

C. Adding

C1. Adding a unit at the end of an Act or instrument

70 This form applies when adding a unit at the end of an Act or instrument, *unless the unit is being added at the end of another unit (so as to become part of the unit)*. For example, this form applies when adding a Schedule at the end of an Act or instrument.

71 For an Act or instrument that has Schedules, the “end of the Act or instrument” is after the last Schedule. Therefore this form is *not* used when inserting something after the last section, but before the Schedules, in an Act or instrument.

777 At the end of the Act

Add:

777 At the end of the regulation

Add:

C2. Adding a unit at the end of another unit

72 This form applies in cases where a unit is being added at the end of another unit (so as to become part of the unit). The only exceptions are:

- (a) a definition, which is “inserted” even when it will be at the end of the definition section or subsection; and
- (b) an amendment adding a unit to a principal Act or instrument or a unit of a principal Act or instrument that deals with application, transitional and savings provisions; and
- (c) adding a table item to a table in a Schedule to the *Financial Framework (Supplementary Powers) Regulations 1997*.

73 The new unit is added at the end of the next “higher” unit. The item heading generally identifies the “higher” unit and includes the words “at the end of”.

777 At the end of subsection 200(1)

Add:

; (c) each person who was given a copy of the original notice.

777 Subsection 200(4) (at the end of the definition of *domestic animal*)

Add:

; (c) any cat other than a tiger.

C2A. Adding units dealing with application, transitional and savings provisions and adding table items to a table in a Schedule to the *Financial Framework (Supplementary Powers) Regulations 1997*

74 When application, transitional and savings provisions are included in frequently amended principal Acts and instruments, more than one amending Act or instrument may need to add units dealing with such provisions at the end of the Act or instrument or a unit of

the Act or instrument. In these cases, it is not always clear in which order the amending Acts or instruments will commence, causing problems for the traditional amending form of “At the end of the [Act/instrument/unit], add”.

75 For example, a Bill in Parliament adds Part 10.25 to Chapter 10 of the *Corporations Act 2001*, using the amending form “At the end of Chapter 10, add”. Another Bill that is introduced into the Parliament after the first Bill, adds Part 10.26 to that Chapter, also using the amending form “At the end of Chapter 10, add”. Both Bills have a day after Royal Assent commencement. If the second Bill commences first, its amending form will work to add Part 10.26 at the end of Chapter 10 (and after Part 10.24). But the result of this amendment is that the amending form for the first Bill would add Part 10.25 after Part 10.26.

76 A similar issue arises when adding table items to a table in a Schedule to the *Financial Framework (Supplementary Powers) Regulations 1997*.

77 The amending form discussed below avoids this problem.

78 This form is to be used where an amendment is to add:

- (a) one or more units, consisting of application, transitional or savings provisions, in a location of the principal Act or instrument; or
- (b) a table item to a table in a Schedule to the *Financial Framework (Supplementary Powers) Regulations 1997*.

79 It does not matter whether the location of the addition is at the end of the principal Act or instrument, or at the end of a unit of the principal Act or instrument that is at a higher level than the units being added.

80 In order to use this form:

- (a) each of the units being added must have a purely numerical number that is one greater than the previous unit (taking into account any other amending Act, Bills or instruments that are adding units in the same location); and
- (b) if there are sub-units of the units being added, the numbers (which may be numerical or alphanumerical) of the sub-units must be determined.

81 The reason for limiting paragraph 80(a) to units with numerical numbers is that it is important for the Publications group to be able to identify exactly where to put the units when a compilation is prepared, and there is no rule for the order in which alphanumerical numbers occur (for example, section 2A may occur before or after section 2AA). (However, in the majority of cases, application, transitional and savings provisions will be added at the end of an Act or instrument so it will be rare that alphanumerical numbers would be required.)

82 Instead of using “At the end of [Act/instrument/unit], Add”, this amending form avoids the issues mentioned above by using “In the appropriate position, Insert”.

83 If the units are being added to a higher-level unit of the Bill or instrument (such as a Schedule, Chapter, Part or Division), rather than at the end of the Bill or instrument, the item heading also refers to the higher-level unit in which the units are being inserted.

84 In the example above, the drafter of the first Bill will number his or her Part as Part 10.25, and the section numbers for Part 10.25 will continue on from the final section of the previous Part. The drafter of the later Bill can assume that the next Part is 10.26 and again continue the section numbering on from the final section in Part 10.25.

85 Although each amendment may (depending on timing) be conceptually an addition (because the location of the amendment may be at the end of an Act or instrument, or at the end of a higher level unit), the amending form is “Insert:”.

86 The same principles apply to multiple amendments to add Subdivisions at the end of a Division, but in that case, each additional Subdivision must have a single Subdivision letter, the amending item heading is “In the appropriate position in Division [X] of Part [X]”, and the item is “Insert:”.

777A In the appropriate position

C3. Adding words

87 This form applies when adding words at the end of a complete unit, for example, when adding words at the end of a subsection. The item heading identifies the “higher” unit.

777 At the end of subsection 200(1)

Add “or during any earlier year”.

777 At the end of subsection 200(4)

Add:

and must give a copy of the summons to each of the following persons:

- (a) the responsible authority for the State;
- (b) each person who received a copy of the original summons.

D. Inserting (not at the end)

D1. Inserting a unit

88 The item heading should, if possible, identify an existing unit of the *same* type as the inserted unit. For example, when inserting a Chapter, it should identify the existing Chapter after which the new one is to be inserted. In some cases the insert form is used where it is not possible to identify an existing unit of the same type. For example, when inserting a heading to a provision.

89 The item heading should, generally, identify the unit *after* which the new unit is to be inserted. In some cases, it may be appropriate for the item heading to identify the unit *before* which the new unit is to be inserted (e.g. when inserting new headings to Parts, Divisions, Subdivisions or subsections).

777 After Part 3 of Chapter 6

Insert:

[text of new Part]

[In Acts or instruments with unique Part numbering (e.g. the Aged Care Act 1997, the Fair Work Act 2009, the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997), it is not necessary to refer to the Chapter number in the amending item heading.]

777 Subsection 200(4) (after paragraph (b) of the definition of *domestic animal*)

Insert:

(ba) crocodiles less than 3 metres long;

D2. Inserting words

90 The item heading identifies the unit into which the words are to be inserted.

777 Subsection 200(4) (paragraph (b) of the definition of *animal*)

After “frog”, insert “, toad”.

E. Decentralised tables of contents

91 Sometimes a Part, Division or Subdivision contains its own table of contents or table of sections, known as a decentralised table of contents. For example, decentralised tables of contents are used in the *Civil Aviation Safety Regulations 1998*, the *Civil Aviation Regulations 1988*, and the Acts that make up the tax code.

92 If you amend legislation to include in it a new unit (such as a Division or Subdivision) and that unit is to contain a decentralised table of contents, you should include the table in the amendment.

93 If you are amending legislation that contains decentralised tables of contents and a provision stating that these tables are not part of the legislation (see, for instance, section 950-105 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997* and regulation 1.006 of the *Civil Aviation Safety Regulations 1998*), you should not amend a table of contents when you make an amendment that will affect the accuracy of the table. The table will be updated by the Compilations team when the legislation is compiled.

94 However, if legislation contains decentralised tables of contents but doesn't expressly state that those tables are not part of the legislation, any necessary changes to the tables should be made by formal amendments. If you are dealing with such legislation, it would also be desirable to include a provision of the kind mentioned above; this will reduce the work required to make any further amendments.

95 Some examples of amendments to decentralised tables of contents are as follows:

777 Part 11 (table of contents)

Repeal the table, substitute:

Table of contents

Subpart 11.A—Preliminary

- 11.005 Purpose of Part
- 11.010 What is in this Part

Subpart 11.B—Applications for authorisations

- 11.020 Effect of this Subpart
- 11.025 Application of Part 11 to authorised persons

777 Part 21 (table of contents)

Omit the entry for section 21.112.

777 Part 11 (table of contents)

Omit the entry for section 11.090, substitute:

- 11.090 Authorisation document—authorisations to which Chicago Convention, Annex 1 applies

777 Part 131 (table of contents)

Omit the entry for Division 131.E.1, substitute:

Division 131.E.1—Preliminary

777 Part 67 (table of contents)

Omit all the entries from and including the entry for Subpart 67.D to and including the entry for section 67.275, substitute:

Subpart 67.D—Modified Austroads medical standards

- 67.262 Definition of *meets the modified Austroads medical standards*
- 67.263 Definition of *modified Austroads medical standards* for Subpart 67.D

Subpart 67.E—Responsibilities of holders of medical certificates and recreational aviation medical practitioner’s certificates

- 67.265 Obligation to tell CASA of changes in medical condition—medical certificate holders
- 67.270 Offence—doing act while efficiency impaired—licence holders
- 67.271 Offence—doing act while efficiency impaired—student pilots
- 67.275 Surrender of medical certificates

777 Part 67 (at the end of the table of contents)

Add:

- 67.275 Surrender of medical certificates

777 Part 11 (table of contents)

After the entry for Subpart 11.B, insert:

- 11.020 Effect of this Subpart

96 Amendments to omit, substitute, add or insert words in an entry in a decentralised table of contents must not be made. An amendment of this kind must be made by omitting and substituting the whole entry.

F. Definitions

F1. Amending definitions

97 The following rules apply to amendments of a provision that contains a list of definitions (usually a section or subsection):

- (a) One amending item may be used to insert several definitions in a provision, provided there are no intervening amendments. If there are 2 Bills or instruments being drafted, or in Parliament or awaiting signature, that are inserting definitions into the same section and the order in which they will commence is not clear, each Bill or instrument may either ignore the other for the purpose of this rule or the amendments may be drafted in a way that avoids a clash. You should not do contingent amendments to try to cover the different commencement possibilities.
- (b) Amending items are arranged according to the correct order of the definitions they deal with (even if the definitions do not appear in correct order in the provision being amended).
- (c) The “substitute” form is used only for “true substitutions” i.e. those where the old defined term and the new defined term are the same. An old defined term is considered to be the same as a new defined term even if the old defined term begins with a capital letter (e.g. *Motor vehicle*) and the new defined term does not (e.g. *motor vehicle*).
- (d) If it is necessary to amend the defined term, the whole of the definition must be replaced.

98 There is normally no need to specify the alphabetical positions in which new definitions are inserted. Section 11A of the *Acts Interpretation Act 1901* provides that the definitions are inserted in their appropriate alphabetical positions, determined on a letter-by-letter basis. However, if a definition cannot be unambiguously positioned on a letter-by-letter basis (e.g. if a defined term includes numbers) its location must be specified. See Word Note 4 in relation to the correct order of definitions.

99 Sometimes a definition will be defining 2 related terms in the one definition as follows:

Private Postal officer or PPO means ...

100 To amend definitions with 2 related defined terms, only the terms should be set out in the item heading in bold italic; the conjunction should not be in bold italic.

777 Subsection 4(1) (definition of *Private Postal Officer or PPO*)

Omit “entity”, substitute “body”.

F2. Relocating definitions

101 The following form should be used to relocate a definition that is out of sequence. It should not be used to relocate any other kind of provision:

777 Subsection 3(1) (definition of *social security benefit*)

Relocate the definition to its appropriate alphabetical position, determined on a letter-by-letter basis.

G. Diagrams, forms and other graphics

102 Generally, if a diagram, flowchart, form, formula or other graphic is to be amended, it should be completely replaced. If there is not enough time, or there are other good reasons for not completely replacing it, it may, with the approval of the head drafter, be amended by textual amendments in the normal way.

777 Schedule 1 (Form 7)

Repeal the form, substitute:

[Text of replacement form.]

H. Dot points

103 Amendments of dot points must be drafted in a way that avoids referring to the dot points. For example, if the dot points are in a simplified outline, they could be amended using the following form:

777 Section 4

After:

- This Act establishes the Australian Civilian Corps.

insert:

- The Australian Civilian Corps consists of persons engaged under this Act as Australian Civilian Corps employees.

104 See Word Notes 4 and 30 for further rules about using, amending and formatting dot points.

J. Headings

105 Headings at any level must be amended by repealing and substituting the whole heading. You should not omit and substitute words in a heading.

106 You can use the ASS macro to draft amendments of headings (except aat-style headings in amending Schedules).

107 Some of the commercial services insert their own subsection headings and these may not be easily distinguished from the subsection headings actually included in the legislation. You should check the status of any headings found in the commercial services before including amendments of them.

K. Method statements, rate calculators and other similar features

108 Attachment C of Word Note 30 (Formatting Social Security and Veterans' Affairs Bills) sets out the correct amending forms for amending method statements, rate calculators and other similar features in such Bills. That Word Note also applies for amending similar features in other Acts or instruments.

L. Multiple amendments and repeals

109 There are 4 alternative methods:

- (a) multiple amendments or repeals in one item otherwise than by using a paragraphed list of provisions or a table (see Subpart L1); and
- (b) multiple amendments or repeals in one item using a paragraphed list of provisions or a table (see Subpart L2); and
- (c) multiple amendments or repeals using a separate Schedule or a separate Part of a Schedule (see Subpart L3); and
- (d) multiple amendments to change references across an Act or instrument (see generally Subpart L4), including multiple amendments to insert feminine pronouns (see Subpart L5).

110 You must obtain approval from the head drafter if you intend to use a multiple amending form that is not provided for in this manual.

L1. Multiple amendments or repeals in one item otherwise than by using a paragraphed list of provisions or a table

111 The multiple amendments or repeals in one item method uses an amending item (other than an item containing a table or a paragraphed list of provisions) to make multiple amendments or repeals.

112 The multiple amendments or repeals in one item method can be used only where the unit of text to be amended or repealed is at the same level in each occurrence (e.g. section, subsection, and paragraph). The units do not need to be consecutive.

113 The method should not be used to amend more than one provision if amendments of one or more intervening provisions are also being made in the same amending Schedule (not broken into Parts or Divisions), or the same amending Part or Division. For example, sections 21 and 23 may not be amended in the same amending item of a Schedule, Part or Division if a different amendment of section 22 is also being included in that Schedule, Part or Division.

114 This method may be used to amend all the provisions within a specified range of provisions, indicated by the word “to” (e.g. “Sections 23 to 52”). However, the method should not be used to repeal, or repeal and substitute, a range of provisions if those provisions are broken up by higher level headings. For example, if sections 23 to 26 are in Part 3 and sections 27 to 52 are in Part 4, sections 23 to 26 should be repealed using a separate amending item to the item repealing sections 27 to 52.

115 This method should not be used to repeal more than 2 definitions at once. (See Subpart L2 in relation to multiple repeals of definitions.)

116 This method should also not be used to amend or repeal identical definitions, or table items, from multiple provisions. In that case, use a separate amendment for each provision.

117 Examples of multiple amendments and repeals at the same level are as follows.

777 Sections 23, 26 and 135

Omit “cat”, substitute “dog”.

777 Paragraphs 43(1)(a) and (b), 46(1)(b) and 136(1)(g)

Omit “cat”, substitute “dog”.

777 Subsections 143(1), 146(1) and 148(1), (2) and (3)

Repeal the subsections.

777 Subsections 64U(2) to (4)

Repeal the subsections.

777 Paragraphs 149(1)(a), (b) and (e)

Repeal the paragraphs.

777 Paragraphs 150(1)(b) to (f)

Repeal the paragraphs.

777 Subsections 92(1) and (1A) (penalty)

Repeal the penalty, substitute:

Penalty: Imprisonment for 2 years or 120 penalty units, or both.

777 Subsection 12(3) and (6) (note)

Repeal the note.

118 The method can be used to amend a definitions provision to insert a number of definitions if there are no intervening amendments of other definitions in that provision.

119 Similarly, there are a number of instruments with large lists and it is often necessary to insert a large amount of material into these lists each time the instrument is amended. There are also similar lists in some Acts.

120 A single amendment can insert multiple items into a list, or multiple definitions into a section, even if they will not be sequential in the principal Act or instrument, as long as there are no intervening amendments.

121 Section 11A of the *Acts Interpretation Act 1901* will ensure that the terms/items are inserted in their appropriate alphabetical positions (unless the list is not alphabetical). Therefore, the amending line should just state “Insert:”.

122 An example of how to amend a definitions provision or alphabetical list to insert a number of definitions or entries if there are no intervening amendments of other definitions or entries in that provision is:

777 Subsection 995-1(1)

Insert:

long term bond rate, for a period, means:

- (a) the average, expressed as a decimal fraction to 4 decimal places (rounding up if the fifth decimal place is 5 or more), of the daily assessed Australian Government bond

capital market yields in respect of 10-year non-rebate Treasury bonds published by the Reserve Bank in relation to the period; or

- (b) if no such yields in respect of bonds of that kind were published by the Reserve Bank in relation to the period, the decimal fraction determined by the Minister by legislative instrument for the purposes of this definition in relation to the period.

miner has the meaning given by section 300-1 of the *Minerals Resource Rent Tax Act 2012*.

mining and quarrying operations has the meaning given by section 40-730.

123 In the case of alphabetical lists other than lists of definitions, multiple entries can also be omitted from the list by a single item (even if they are not consecutive) as long as there are no intervening amendments of other entries in the list. For example:

777 Schedule 5

Omit:

Capsicum annuum

Capsicum annuum var. *acuminatum*

Capsicum annuum var. *annuum*

Capsicum annuum var. *aviculare*

Capsicum annuum var. *cerasiforme*

L2. Multiple amendments or repeals in one item using a paragraphed list of provisions or a table

124 Sometimes it will be appropriate to set out multiple amendments or repeals in a table or a paragraphed list of provisions. This will usually occur where there are many amendments of a similar term or of related terms. The form is also suitable for amendments to replace asterisks or to amend or repeal definitions.

125 To ensure that a consistent approach is being adopted, all amendments in tables need the approval of the head drafter, and any drafter who is unsure whether proposed amendments would be suitable for any version of this method should discuss the matter with the head drafter.

126 If a table is used, or amendments of one or more intervening provisions are also being made in the same amending Schedule (not broken into Parts or Divisions), the amending item should appear at the end of a group of items amending the Act or instrument concerned. In other words, the item containing the table or a paragraphed list of provisions would be the last item in an amending Schedule, Part or Division, unless more than one Act or instrument is amended in the Schedule, Part or Division. In that case, the item would be the last under the relevant Act or instrument title at-style heading.

127 If 2 or more paragraphed lists or 2 or more multiple amendment tables amending the same Act or instrument are to be included, and the amendments to be made by one paragraphed list or table would overlap with the amendments to be made by the other paragraphed lists or tables (in that they would cause the compilers to double back in the legislation to be amended), then the second and any subsequent paragraphed list or table should be put into a separate Part or Division.

128 To make it more likely that the items will be found in cross-checking searches, the item heading “Amendments of listed provisions” (followed by some description if appropriate) must be used.

129 Examples are set out below.

777 Subsection 4(1)

Repeal the following definitions:

- (a) definition of *cat*;
- (b) definition of *dog*;
- (c) definition of *goanna*;
- (d) definition of *kangaroo*;
- (e) definition of *mouse*;
- (f) definition of *rat*;
- (g) definition of *snake*;
- (h) definition of *wallaby*.

[This is an example of the repeal of a number of definitions in a definitions provision where there is no intervening amendment of a definition in that provision.]

[Note: It is not possible to repeal and substitute a number of definitions in the one item.]

777 Subsection 4(1)

Repeal the following definitions:

- (a) definition of *cat*;
- (b) definition of *dog*;
- (c) definition of *goanna*;
- (d) definition of *kangaroo*;
- (e) definition of *mouse*.

777 Subsection 4(1) (definition of possum)

After “brush-tailed,” insert “ringtail,”.

777 Subsection 4(1)

Repeal the following definitions:

- (a) definition of *rat*;
- (b) definition of *snake*;
- (c) definition of *wallaby*.

[These 3 amendments are an example of the repeal of a number of definitions in a definitions provision where there is an intervening amendment of a definition in that provision. These would go in the normal position in the Schedule etc.]

777 Amendments of listed provisions—Chief Executive Officer

Omit “General Manager” (wherever occurring) and substitute “Chief Executive Officer” in the following provisions:

- (a) section 3 (definition of *officer*);
- (b) subsection 4(2);
- (c) paragraph 6(1)(c);

- (d) subparagraphs 7(2)(f)(ii) and (iii);
- (e) subsections 10(3A) and (3B);
- (f) Schedule 3, items 7 and 9;
- (g) Schedule 4, item 9.

[This is an example of a number of amendments done as further amendments. This would go at the end of the Schedule etc.]

[The words “(wherever occurring)” are only required if the words to be omitted occur more than once in 1 or more of the listed provisions.]

777 Amendments of listed provisions—repeals

Repeal the following provisions:

- (a) subsections 14(1), 15(1) and 16(1), (2) and (3);
- (b) paragraphs 17(1)(a), (b) and (e);
- (c) subsection 18(2);
- (d) paragraph 19(3)(c);
- (e) section 20;
- (f) paragraphs 21(2)(b) and (d);
- (g) subsections 22(1) and (4).

[This is an example of the repeal of a number of provisions done as further amendments. This would go at the end of the Schedule etc.]

130 Note that the items are arranged in strict order of the provisions being amended. They are not grouped according to the term to be changed. Nor are they grouped by the level of provision (section, subsection or paragraph) being amended. Provisions of the same level can be grouped (as in items 6 and 8 of the asterisking example), but only if they are being amended in the same way, and the grouping does not result in any of the grouped provisions being out of order relative to provisions amended by other items in the table.

131 Note that where the words to be amended occur more than once in a provision, words such as “(first occurring)” or “(wherever occurring)” should be included in the relevant items of the table to indicate which occurrence(s) of the words are to be amended. If you want to amend every occurrence of the specified words in every provision mentioned in the table, and the specified words occur more than once in at least one of the provisions mentioned in the table, you may include the words “(wherever occurring)” in the column heading instead of including them in individual items of the table.

L3. Multiple amendments or repeals using a separate Schedule or a separate Part of a Schedule

132 If the same amendment is being made to a large number of provisions, an alternative method is to make the amendments in a separate Schedule or a separate Part of a Schedule. The first item of the Schedule or Part would set out the amendment and be followed by item headings listing the provisions to be amended. This method is suitable for amendments of a single Act or instrument and amendments of multiple Acts or instruments.

133 Acts, instruments and units of text can also be repealed using this method.

134 Here are some examples:

Schedule 4—Amendments of certain Acts to correct references to the Remuneration Tribunal Act 1973

1 Amendments of Acts

Omit “*Tribunals*” and substitute “*Tribunal*” in the specified provisions of the Acts listed in this Schedule.

[This form can be used to substitute the same phrase in a number of provisions if the phrase to be substituted occurs once only in the specified provisions. If the phrase occurs more than once in a provision, use the form in the next example.]

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Commission Act 1989

2 Subsection 194(3)

Aboriginal Land Rights (Northern Territory) Act 1976

3 Subsection 77(4)

Administrative Appeals Tribunal Act 1975

4 Subsection 9(3)

5 Subsection 53(3)

Schedule 6—Amendments of other Acts to change references to the Trade Practices Act 1974

1 Amendments of Acts

Omit “*Trade Practices Act 1974*” (wherever occurring) and substitute “*Competition and Consumer Act 2010*” in the specified provisions of the Acts listed in this Schedule.

Liquid Fuel Emergency Act 1984

2 Section 43

Telecommunications Act 1997

3 Subsections 98(2), 102(6) and 103(3)

[This form can be used to substitute the same phrase wherever it occurs in a number of provisions (including in notes at the foot of those provisions). Note that the phrase “(wherever occurring)” is included in item 1 after the expression that is to be omitted. If a provision that is to be amended using this form has one or more notes, it is not necessary to include “(including the notes)” in the amending item heading. The notes are considered to be part of the provision being amended, so they will also be amended.]

Schedule 4—Repeals of Acts

1 Repeals of Acts

Repeal the following Acts:

Anti-Dumping Authority Act 1988

Archives Act 1983

Audit Act 1901

L4. Multiple amendments to change references across an Act or instrument

135 This method of multiple amendments may only be used with the approval of the head drafter. In the past it has mainly been used to insert feminine pronouns (see Subpart L5 for the amendments to do this) but it may be suitable in other cases—for example where the name of a body or office is changing.

136 If an Act or instrument requires substantial amendments of this kind, it may be appropriate to use the following general provision. You must still check each relevant provision individually to work out the best form of amendment.

777 The whole of the Act

Omit every occurrence of “Federal Magistrate”, substitute “Federal Circuit Court Judge”.

777 The whole of the Act

Omit every occurrence of “Federal Magistrates Court”, substitute “Federal Circuit Court”.

137 These forms of amendment will not *always* give the right result. If you plan to use this method of amendment, you must check the Act or instrument to ensure that it produces no identifiable problems.

L5. Multiple amendments to insert feminine pronouns

138 This method of multiple amendments is an example of the method described in Subpart L4 and may only be used with the approval of the head drafter.

139 Individual amendments to insert feminine pronouns can be time-consuming and tedious to draft. On the other hand, it is probably true that the best results (in terms of the elegance of the resulting text) are achieved by checking each relevant provision individually and working out the best form of amendment. However, if an Act or instrument requires substantial amendments of this kind, it may be appropriate to use the following set of general amendments:

777 The whole of the Act

Amend so that every occurrence of “he” is followed once by “or she”.

777 The whole of the Act

Amend so that every occurrence of “him” is followed once by “or her”.

777 The whole of the Act

Amend so that every occurrence of “himself” is followed once by “or herself”.

777 The whole of the Act

Amend so that every occurrence of “his” is followed once by “or her”.

140 These forms of amendments will not *always* give the right result (e.g. if the Act or instrument already has “she or he” or “his office or her office”). If you plan to use this method of amendment, you should check the Act or instrument to ensure that it produces no identifiable problems.

L6. Commencement of multiple amendments

141 Amendments using the forms set out above should generally be expressed to commence *immediately after* all other amendments included in the same Bill or instrument have commenced.

L7. Dangers of using multiple amendment forms

142 The use of multiple amendment forms can increase the risk of misdescribed amendments occurring.

143 In a recent case, a “misdescribed amendment” occurred in the following way.

144 The amendment was not misdescribed when it was introduced. Some months after it was introduced, another Bill was introduced that amended the same provision by a multiple amendment form to insert feminine pronouns. The second Bill was passed, and commenced before the commencement of the first Bill. As a result, the earlier amendment could not operate as intended.

145 The “misdescribed amendment” arose because the two Bills were not passed in the order in which they were drafted; it did not arise directly from the use of the multiple amendment form. However, the drafter preparing the multiple amendments should have undertaken the normal checks for other amendments of provisions affected by the multiple amendments, and should have made appropriate commencement provisions to deal with the possibility of the second Bill being passed first.

146 If you propose to use a multiple amendment form, you will still need to run the normal checks to find other current amendments of affected provisions of the principal Act or instrument. Also, of course, when you run those normal checks in the course of drafting other kinds of amendments, you should always check for amendments expressed to apply to the whole of an Act or instrument.

LA. Notional text (modifications)

147 Some provisions in legislation modify the operation of other provisions by making notional amendments of their text.

148 Some notional amendments have been formatted in the same way as amending Schedule items. For example:

6 Subsection 10(1)

Repeal the subsection, substitute:

- (1) A TCF contract outworker is eligible for an advance if the Secretary is satisfied of all of the following:
 - (a) the TCF contract outworker has ceased to do work for the specified person;
 - (b) after the commencement of this section, an insolvency event happened to the specified person;
 - (c) the TCF contract outworker is (or would, apart from the discharge of the bankruptcy of the specified person, be) owed one or more debts wholly or partly attributable to work done for the specified person in the capacity of an outworker.

149 To amend notional text that has been inserted using items formatted like amending Schedule items, use the amending forms set out in Subpart P2 for amendments of amending Schedules. For example:

1 Item 6 of Schedule 1 (paragraph 10(1)(c))

Repeal the paragraph.

150 Sometimes notional text is included within a section in the body of an Act or instrument. For example:

8 Legal Services Directions

Section 55ZF of the *Judiciary Act 1903* applies as if that section included the following subsections:

- (5) Subsection (4) ceases to apply at the earlier of the following times:
 - (a) the end of the first reporting period that commences at or after the commencement time;
 - (b) the time when the directions are repealed.

...

151 To amend notional text that has been included within a section in the body of an Act or instrument, identify the section first and then, in parentheses, identify the part of the notional text to be amended. For example:

8 Section 8 (paragraph 55ZF(5)(a) of the *Judiciary Act 1903*)

Omit “at or after the commencement time”, substitute “on or after 1 July 2014”.

M. Readers guides

152 If you are drafting amendments of legislation containing a readers guide, you should, if possible, repeal the readers guide by formal amendment. If appropriate, the readers guide can be replaced with a simplified outline.

153 If you are planning to create or amend a readers guide, you must consult the head drafter.

154 Because of the variety of forms that readers guides take, drafters will need to adapt the standard amending forms to suit the particular guide they are amending. Note, however, that this does not extend to matching case or including any apostrophe in “Readers”. The correct form is “Readers guide” (i.e. no apostrophe in “Readers” and no initial capital letter for “guide”). Some examples are as follows:

777 Readers guide (third paragraph under the heading “Overview of this Act”)

Omit “of this Act”.

777 Readers guide (list of terms defined in section 6)

Omit “approved trading house”.

777 Readers guide (diagram 2)

Repeal the diagram.

N. Renumbering

155 Provisions should not be renumbered except in exceptional cases, or, in the case of a billable instrument, on express instructions.

N1. Renumbering a whole Act or instrument

156 To renumber an Act or instrument, include an item in the amending Schedule modelled on Schedule 5 to the *Workplace Relations Amendment (Work Choices) Act 2005* (No. 153 of 2005). (However, note that the precedent will need to be adapted if it is necessary to renumber Chapters.)

N2. Renumbering an individual provision

157 To renumber a specific provision, use the following forms:

777 Section 49A

Renumber as section 75.

777 Subsection 10(2A)

Renumber as subsection (3).

158 If the text of the renumbered provision needs to be amended by the same amending Act or instrument, the amendment should refer to it by its former number.

N3. Renumbering to correct duplicated numbers

159 The following form should be used to renumber a provision that has the same number as another provision, where the provisions were inserted by different amending Acts or instruments:

777 Subclause 10(2A) of Schedule 5 (the subclause (2A) inserted by item 85 of Schedule 6 to the *Veterans' Affairs Legislation Amendment Act (No. 1) 2002*)

Renumber as subclause (2B).

160 The following form should be used to renumber a provision that has the same number as another provision, where the provisions were inserted by the same Act or instrument:

777 Subsection 21(6) (second occurring)

Omit “(6) The person”, substitute “(7) The person”.

[These are examples of statute law revision amendments. For more information on Statute Law Revision amendments, see Drafting Direction 4.4.]

N4. When an amendment contracts a section to a single block of text

161 When an amendment contracts a section to a single block of text, the remaining text should be amended so that no “phantom” subsection number remains.

162 The Compilations team has advised that they would never alter the text to remove a subsection number, because this might affect cross-references. This means, for example, that the Compilations team has treated as misdescribed an amendment that refers to “Paragraph 46(b)” when the text of section 46 was preceded by a “(2)”.

163 To avoid this, as well as the oddity of “phantom” subsection numbers:

- (a) the drafter should amend the remaining subsection to omit whatever subsection number precedes its text; and
- (b) if the text of that remaining subsection needs to be amended by the same amending Act or instrument, the amendment should refer to it by its subsection number.

164 The amendments should commence at the same time.

165 Drafters should also check for any affected cross-references.

N5. Fixing “phantom” subsection numbers in already-contracted sections

166 If, when amending an Act or instrument, a drafter notices in the Act or instrument a subsection number appearing before a single block of text constituting a section:

- (a) the drafter should draft an amendment to omit the subsection number; and
- (b) if the text of the section needs to be amended by the same amending Act or instrument, the amendment should still refer to it by the subsection number.

167 The amendments should commence at the same time.

168 Drafters should also check for any affected cross-references.

N6. Adding a subsection to a section that is not divided into subsections

169 When one or more subsections are added to a section that is not divided into subsections:

- (a) the drafter should insert a “(1)” before the existing opening text of the section; and
- (b) if the existing text needs to be amended by the same amending Act or instrument, the amendment should refer to it by its section number (not as subsection (1)).

170 The amendments should commence at the same time.

171 Drafters should also check for any affected cross-references.

P. Schedules

172 Schedules often contain units that correspond to units found in the body of an Act or instrument, for example, clauses or items (corresponding to sections), subclauses or subitems (corresponding to subsections), paragraphs, definitions etc. The amendment forms deal with these units in Schedules in a way that corresponds closely to the way they would be dealt with if they appeared in the body of an Act or instrument. The general principle is to use the same form as for the body of an Act or instrument, with the addition of the words “of the Schedule”, “of Schedule 1” etc. The following examples illustrate this principle.

P1. Amendments of non-amending Schedules

173 Provisions in non-amending Schedules that are formatted like sections are usually called clauses. However, they are sometimes called items or sections. They are amended by identifying in the item heading the clause, item or section number, followed by the Schedule number.

777 Subclause 200(4) of Schedule 1

After “frog”, insert “, toad”.

777 Subclause 200(4) of the Schedule (paragraph (b) of the definition of *animal*)

After “frog”, insert “, toad”.

777 Subclause 010.211(1) of Schedule 2

Omit “(5) or (6)”, substitute “(5), (6) or (7)”.

777 Subclause 1.2.3(3) of Schedule 1

Omit “vaccine”, substitute “medicine”.

777 Subparagraph 1.2.8(2)(a)(i) of Schedule 1

After “medical practitioner”, insert “or a hospital”.

777 Division 2.42 of Schedule 1 (heading)

Repeal the heading, substitute:

777 Item 5 of Part 3 of Schedule 1 (heading)

Repeal the heading, substitute:

777 Subitem 5.3 of Part 3 of Schedule 6

Repeal the subitem, substitute:

777 Paragraph 5.10(a) of Part 3 of Schedule 6

Omit “authorised officer”, substitute “inspector”.

174 Items in tables or numbered lists in a non-amending Schedule should be amended using the forms for tables, regardless of whether the items are called “table items” or just “items”. Whether the term “table item” or “item” is used in the amending form depends on how the provision is referred to in the legislation to be amended.

175 If the table or numbered list is within a clause, the clause should be identified first followed by the Schedule reference. If there is no clause, but the table or numbered list is within a Part, the Part should be identified first followed by the Schedule reference. If the table does not belong to a clause or Part, just the Schedule is identified. This is then followed in parenthesis by the location of the amendment in the table or numbered list.

176 If a list is formatted as a table, any substituted or inserted table items should be formatted with `Tabletext,tt` style, regardless of whether the table to be amended has been formatted with the `Tabletext,tt` style or with some other style. However, if you are amending a table in a billable instrument that does not use `Tabletext,tt` style, check with the head drafter as to which style to use.

177 If a list is not formatted as a table, any substituted or inserted items should match as closely as possible the style already used for the other items in the provision. If in doubt as to which style to use, check with the head drafter.

777 Clause 23 of Schedule 1 (table item 3, column 4)

Omit “Board”, substitute “Commission”.

777 Part 2 of Schedule 6 (cell at item 1A, column 3)

Repeal the cell, substitute:

To suspend an approved provider from
making appraisals under section 25-3 and
reappraisals under section 27-5

[The substituted cell should be aligned with the word “Repeal”.]

777 Schedule 9 (item 11)

Repeal the item, substitute:

11. Australian Capital Territory

777 Part 1 of Schedule 10 (table item 8)

Repeal the item, substitute:

8	New South Wales	10,239,835
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777 Part 4 of Schedule 11 (item 10)

Omit “868-85-9”, substitute “868-86-9”.

777 Part 2 of Schedule 13 (item 41, column headed “Requirements”, after paragraph (f))

Insert:

(fa) the number of persons; or

[See Part S for further examples.]

P2. Amendments of amending Schedules

777 Item 200 of Schedule 1 (heading)

Repeal the heading, substitute:

200 Transitional provisions

[Remember to apply the “Special Style” formatting to the replacement item heading.]

777 Item 200 of Schedule 1

Omit “the paragraph”, substitute “the subparagraph”.

777 Item 57 of Schedule 1 (after subsection 148C(2))

Insert:

777 Item 200 of Schedule 1 (paragraph (b) of the definition of *frog* in subsection 32(9A))

Omit “groan”, substitute “green”.

777 Subitem 200(4) of Schedule 1

After “1995, ”, insert “1996”.

[In this example, the amendment is being made to an application subitem in a Schedule to an amending Bill. Amending or repealing items are never divided into subitems.]

777 Items 9 and 10 of Schedule 5

Repeal the items.

[The above form is to be used to repeal an amending item or items. If the repeal will mean that there are no amending items remaining under the relevant Act or instrument title at style heading, you will also need to include a separate amending item to repeal that heading (see the example below).]

777 Schedule 5 (heading specifying *Fair Work Act 2009*)

Repeal the heading.

Q. Short titles

178 If you draft an amending item that amends the short title of an Act, you should insert the following note under the item:

Note: This item amends the short title of the Act. If another amendment of the Act is described by reference to the Act's previous short title, that other amendment has effect after the commencement of this item as an amendment of the Act under its amended short title (see section 10 of the *Acts Interpretation Act 1901*).

179 A note is not required for an amending item that amends the name of an instrument.

R. Simplified outlines

180 When amending a simplified outline, the words “simplified outline” should not be used in the amending item heading unless it is not possible to identify the simplified outline by reference to a section number. For example, if a simplified outline is contained in section 5 of an Act or instrument, it should be identified as “Section 5” in the amending item heading not “Section 5 (simplified outline)”.

181 If a simplified outline is not broken into units e.g. paragraphs, it should be amended using the standard amending forms.

182 If a simplified outline is broken into units, e.g. paragraphs, and the changes are not such as to warrant repealing and substituting the outline, there are 2 methods available for amending the outline.

183 The first method is to identify the unit of text affected in the heading to the amending item. Some examples are as follows:

777 Section 101 (after the paragraph relating to Division 4)

Insert:

Division 5 allows the Secretary to establish one or more offshore security zones on and around a security regulated offshore facility.

777 Section 101 (paragraph relating to Division 4)

Omit “Commission”, substitute “Tribunal”.

777 Section 101 (paragraph relating to Division 4)

Repeal the paragraph.

184 You should not identify the text by counting the paragraphs e.g. “Section 101 (second paragraph)”. This is to minimise the possibility of misdescribed amendments and the need for contingent commencements if paragraphs are being inserted in, or omitted from, the simplified outline by another Act or instrument.

185 The second method is to identify the unit of text affected in box form. Some examples are as follows:

777 Section 101

After:

Division 4 allows the Secretary to establish one or more on-board security zones on a regulated Australian ship.

insert:

Division 5 allows the Secretary to establish one or more offshore security zones on and around a security regulated offshore facility.

777 Section 101

Omit:

Division 4 allows the Secretary to establish one or more on-board security zones on a regulated Australian ship.

substitute:

Division 4 allows the Secretary to establish one or more on-board security zones on a regulated Australian ship. It also allows the Secretary to vary those zones.

186 Choosing which method to use depends on what is the clearest and easiest way of identifying the affected text. For example, if a simplified outline is broken into both paragraphs of unnumbered text and lettered paragraphs, using the first method may cause confusion if the only way to identify the text affected is by reference to the “paragraph” it is in. In such a case, the second method may be the clearest way of identifying the affected text.

187 Where a simplified outline contains dot points, these must not be referred to in the amending item. If you want to substitute or otherwise amend any text in a dot point, you must use the second method to identify the dot point. If you want to adopt a different approach in a particular case you will need to seek the approval of the head drafter.

777 Section 4

Omit:

- This Act establishes the Australian Civilian Corps.

substitute:

- This Act establishes the Australian Civilian Corps. The Australian Civilian Corps consists of persons engaged under this Act as Australian Civilian Corps employees.

S. Tables

188 The forms for amending tables follow the same principles as for ordinary text. Amendments of tables need to identify the unit in which the table appears.

189 The amendments need to unambiguously identify the text to be amended. You should do this in a way that is convenient to the reader. This will very often involve referring to table items, column headings or numbers, or both.

S1. Repealing a table

190 The form of the amendment is:

777 Section 23 (table)

Repeal the table.

[This form and the other forms in this Part may need to be modified if there are 2 or more tables in the provision being amended (as in some Divisions of the Health Insurance (General Medical Services Table) Regulation 2012).]

777 Regulation 201.004 (table 201.004)

Repeal the table.

[This form is used for numbered tables such as those found in the Civil Aviation Safety Regulations 1998.]

S2. Replacing the whole of an item or inserting an item in a table

191 In the following discussion, and elsewhere in this manual, table rows are generally referred to as items.

192 Sometimes it will be more convenient, or more helpful to readers, to replace the whole of an item in a table (for example, if amendments are required in more than one cell in the item).

193 Amendments to replace the whole of an item in a table should identify the section (etc.), the table and the item. The substituted text should be in the form of item(s) from the table and be formatted in the appropriate font, size and typeface. The cells in the item(s) should be roughly the size of the original cells and be positioned in approximately the same position as the original cells.

777 Section 23 (table item 2)

Repeal the item, substitute:

2	New South Wales	10,239,835
---	-----------------	------------

194 The form of the amendment to insert a table item is as follows. The cells in the item(s) should be roughly the size of the original cells and be positioned in approximately the same position as the original cells.

777 Section 23 (after table item 2)

Insert:

2A	New South Wales	10,239,835
2B	Northern Territory	20,235,535
2C	Queensland	9,234,585

195 Where a number of table items are grouped under a table subheading, a new item may be included at the end of the grouped table items using the following form:

777 Schedule 2 (at the end of the table items headed “Victoria”)

Add:

5A	Melbourne	10,239,835
----	-----------	------------

S3. Referring to an unnumbered item in a table

196 If you need to refer to an item or a cell in a table in which the items are not numbered, the words “table item x” in the identifying words should be replaced with “table item dealing with x”. The form “table item relating to x” should not be used.

777 Section 23 (table item dealing with the Australian Capital Territory)

Repeal the item, substitute:

Australian Capital Territory	10,239,835
------------------------------	------------

777 Section 23 (cell at table item dealing with the Australian Capital Territory, column headed “amount”)

Repeal the cell, substitute:

10,239,835

S4. Repealing a column in a table

197 If you are considering repealing an entire column of a table, you must seek approval from the head drafter. This is because of the difficulties with formatting that may result from doing so.

S5. Referring to an unnumbered column in a table

198 If you need to refer to a column or a cell in a table in which the columns are not numbered, the columns should not be identified by reference to a column number. Instead, the identifying words should refer to “column headed ‘x’”. Note that the forms “column dealing with x” and “column relating to x” should not be used.

777 Section 85-1 (cell at table item 27, column headed “Decision”)

Repeal the cell, substitute:

To suspend an approved provider from
making appraisals under section 25-3 and
reappraisals under section 27-5

S6. Replacing a cell in a table

199 Sometimes it will be more convenient, or more helpful to readers, to replace the whole of a cell in a table. A “cell” refers to all the text in a column that relates to a table item. It does not refer to the formatting in Word.

200 It is a matter for discretion whether to use this approach or to use one of the other approaches outlined in this Part. If the cell contains only a small number of words or figures, it may be simpler to amend it by omitting and substituting the text, even if the whole text of the cell is to be replaced (see Subpart S10).

201 Amendments to replace the whole of a cell in a table should identify the section (etc.) and the cell in the table. The substituted text should be in a table cell and should be formatted in the appropriate font, size and typeface. No lines should be included. The cell should be roughly the size of the original cell and be aligned with the same margin as the text of the amending words of the amending item (regardless of which column of the table the cell is in).

777 Section 23 (cell at table item 3, column headed “State/Territory”)

Repeal the cell, substitute:

Australian Capital Territory

S7. Amending a heading or subheading in a table

202 Any heading or subheading in a table must be amended by repealing and substituting the whole heading or subheading.

203 The overall heading in the first row of the table is referred to as the “table heading”, the headings to the columns (usually in the second row of the table) are referred to as the column headings and any headings grouping items within the table are referred to as subheadings.

204 In some cases, table items will have their own individual bold headings. Such headings are treated as part of the item and are automatically repealed if the item is repealed.

205 The heading in the first row of a table is amended as follows:

777 Subsection 172(2) (table heading)

Repeal the heading, substitute:

Individual grantor details—permitted searches

206 Column headings are amended as follows:

777 Section 5-2 (table, heading to column headed “Community care subsidy”)

Repeal the heading, substitute:

Home care subsidy

777 Subsection 260(1) (table, heading to column 3)

Repeal the heading, substitute:

Column 3

Titles Administrator

[The column heading includes the column number.]

207 If a table does not have an overall heading but has column headings, or if you want to amend the overall heading as well as the column headings, the following form may be used. However, this form is not appropriate where the table also contains a number of subheadings

that are not being amended, as there may be some confusion as to whether those subheadings are covered by the reference to “headings”:

777 Regulation 15AB (table, headings)

Repeal the headings, substitute:

Calculating periods of time

Item	Column 1	Column 2
	If the period of time:	then the period of time:

208 Table subheadings that are numbered are amended as follows:

777 Rule 20.001 (table, Part 2 (subheading))

Repeal the subheading, substitute:

Part 2—Calculating periods of time

209 Table subheadings that are unnumbered, but that can be referred to by reference to a table item, are amended as follows:

777 Rule 20.00A (subheading before table item 31, column 2)

Repeal the subheading, substitute:

Calculating periods of time

210 Table subheadings that are unnumbered, and that cannot be referred to by reference to a table item, are amended as follows:

777 Section 539 (table, subheading “Other provisions”)

Repeal the subheading, substitute:

Even more provisions

[You should consider whether the unnumbered table subheadings could be replaced with table subheadings that contain Part numbers.]

S8. Replacing or inserting a paragraph in a table

211 Sometimes it will be more convenient, or more helpful to readers, to replace or insert a paragraph in a table. The paragraph to be substituted or inserted should be formatted with Table(a),ta style. It should not be formatted in a cell but should line up with the left page margin.

777 Section 57 (table item 3, column 3, paragraph (a))

Repeal the paragraph, substitute:

(a) the number of persons; and

777 Schedule 11 (table item 1A.01, column headed “Activity”, paragraph (e))

Chapter 2—Parliamentary amendments

Parliamentary amendment forms (general principles)

225 This Chapter sets out the general principles for the amendment forms to be used for Parliamentary amendments of Bills. This Chapter has a small number of examples that help to explain the general principles. Drafters should discuss any novel amending forms they propose to use with the editor before sending Parliamentary amendments for the first editorial check. If necessary, the editor and the drafter should raise any novel form with First Parliamentary Counsel.

226 A fuller set of examples is in Appendix 2A.

Primary units

227 For the purpose of the amendment forms, the following parts of a Bill are primary units, *except where they are in text that is proposed to be inserted in a Principal Act*:

Primary unit	Example of reference
A. In body of the Bill	
A1 title	Title, page 1 (line 5)
A2 preamble	Preamble, page 1 (lines 3 and 4)
A3 clause	Clause 6, page 3 (lines 5 to 12)
A4 heading to a Chapter, Part, Division, Subdivision, clause or subclause	Heading to Division 3, page 10 (line 12)
A5 Chapter, Part, Division or Subdivision	Division 3, clauses 34 to 40, page 10 (lines 1 to 24)
B. Non-amending Schedule	
B1 the whole Schedule	Schedule 1, page 25 (line 1) to page 40 (line 25)
C. Amending Schedule	
C1 the whole Schedule	Schedule 2, page 25 (line 1) to page 40 (line 25)
C2 the Schedule heading	Schedule 2, heading, page 25 (line 1)
C3 amended Act or instrument title at style heading	Schedule 2, heading specifying Act to be amended
C4 item	Schedule 3, item 14, page 25 (lines 3 to 9)

228 Note that the references to Parts, Divisions and Subdivisions are abbreviated (e.g. “Division 3” rather than “Division 3 of Part 6”). Also note that a reference to a Chapter, Part, Division or Subdivision *in the body of the Bill* is followed by a reference to the relevant clauses.

Two standard models for amendment forms

229 All amendment forms use one of the following two models:

- (1) First primary unit, [second primary unit], Page/line description, Action

(2) Page/line description, Action

The first model

230 The first model is the most common one. It is used whenever it is possible to specify at least one primary unit at the start of the form, *without needing to accompany it with a description of location* (e.g. “after”, “at the end of”). Two primary units are specified before the page/line number in cases covered by item A5 and items C2 to C6 of the above table. In all other cases, only one primary unit is specified.

Examples of the first model

- (~) Clause 23, page 27 (lines 12 to 23), omit the clause, substitute:
- (~) Division 3, clauses 77 to 99, page 12 (line 3) to page 23 (line 24), omit the Division, substitute:
- (~) Schedule 2, item 16, page 27 (lines 12 to 23), omit the item, substitute:
- (~) Schedule 3, Division 3, page 12 (line 3) to page 23 (line 24), omit the Division, substitute:

The second model

231 The second model is used whenever the first model cannot be used. This will usually be a case where the amendment adds or inserts a primary unit. The main aim of the second model is to keep the “action” phrase intact, instead of splitting the “before”, “after” etc. from the “insert” or “add”.

Examples of the second model

- (~) Page 6 (after line 3), after clause 6, insert:

[*This form applies e.g. when inserting a Chapter, Part, Division, Subdivision or heading.*]
- (~) Page 30 (after line 15), at the end of Division 2, add:

[*This form applies e.g. when adding a clause or Subdivision at the end of a Division.*]

Referring to page numbers and line numbers

Page and line number references kept together

232 Page and line numbers are always kept together. Except in the case of the Introduction copy of a Bill, only use the page and line numbers from a copy of the Bill printed by CanPrint. In the case of the Introduction copy, you may use the page and line numbers from the PDF version created by OPC. The line numbers in the version on the Parliament website (or even printed from our system) can be different. Copies of the Introduction Print and Third Reading Print (if one is done) of each Bill are kept in the library.

Parentheses for line numbers

233 Line numbers are always specified within parentheses.

Identification extending over 2 or more pages

234 The following form is used for identification that extends over 2 or more pages:

235 “page 6 (line 12) to page 7 (line 16)”.

Insertions before or after lines

236 When inserting a new unit in the Bill, use the following form to specify the line *after* which the new unit is inserted:

“(after line 15)”

237 If it is not possible to specify the line after which the new unit is inserted, then specify the line *before* which it is inserted.

Identification of omitted text

238 Identify both the start *and the end* of the text, by reference to page and line numbers.

Examples of page/line descriptions

- (~) Clause 23, page 12 (line 3), omit “frog or”.
- (~) Clause 23, page 5 (lines 6 and 7), omit subclause (2).
- (~) Schedule 3, Division 3, page 12 (line 3) to page 23 (line 24), omit the Division, substitute:
- (~) Schedule 3, page 12 (after line 12), after item 16, insert:
- (~) Schedule 2, item 777, page 99 (after line 15), after the definition of *aardvark*, insert:

Additional description in the “action” part

239 As a general rule the description in the “action” part of the amending form should be kept as short as possible. In most cases, the page and line number references are sufficient to unambiguously describe the intended amendment.

240 However, in a small number of cases, a minimal description in the “action” part might cause a temporary misunderstanding or an undetected error (if an incorrect line number is specified).

241 To reduce this risk of misunderstanding or error, the “action” part should include sufficient additional description to make the amendment unambiguous without needing to rely on the *line number*, i.e. by relying solely on the primary unit(s), page/line numbers and “action”. This requirement for additional description does *not* apply to the forms that omit words from a specified line, or insert words after existing words in a specified line.

242 If additional description is required, a reference in the additional description to a unit of text should normally use the same form as would be used in an Act when referring to the unit (e.g. “paragraph (a) of the definition of *office*”; “subparagraph (4)(b)(ii)”). However, references to Parts, Divisions and Subdivisions are abbreviated (e.g. “Division 3” rather than “Division 3 of Part 2”).

Examples of extent of description in the “action” part

- (~) Clause 23, page 12 (lines 3 to 5), omit paragraph (4)(a).
- (~) Schedule 3, item 6, page 12 (lines 3 and 4), omit the definition of *dog*.
- (~) Schedule 3, item 6, page 12 (lines 2 to 24), omit Division 3, substitute:
- (~) Clause 6, page 12 (line 3), omit “dog or”.

[No additional description is used. The same form is used irrespective of the part of the clause in which the words occur e.g. in a subclause, in a paragraph of a definition etc.]

Special Senate wording in the “action” part

243 Normally, the word “omit” is used in the action part to indicate that text is to be removed. However, for some Senate amendments that involve removal of text *without substitution*, a “**to be opposed**” form must be used instead.

244 This form applies where the removed text is:

- (a) one or more clauses, items or proposed sections;
- (b) one or more Subdivisions, Divisions, Parts, Chapters or Schedules (i.e. a grouping of clauses, items or proposed sections);
- (c) a preamble.

245 There are 2 forms, depending on whether the removed text is a primary unit:

Example where removed text is a primary unit

- (~) Clause 66, page 99 (lines 5 and 6), **to be opposed**.

Example in other cases

- (~) Schedule 2, item 777, page 99 (line 15) to page 100 (line 20), section 346AB **to be opposed**.

Use of “the” in descriptions

246 The amending forms should generally use the word “the”, rather than omitting it for greater brevity. For example, “*at the end of the section*” is used rather than the abbreviated form “at end of section”.

Use of “proposed”

247 The word “proposed” is *not* to be used in an amendment to distinguish between substantive text of the Bill and text that the Bill proposes to insert in a Principal Act.

Use of commas

248 In the “action” part of the amendment forms, the word “insert”, “add” or “substitute” is always preceded by a comma (even though it is not grammatically necessary in all cases).

Distinction between “add” and “insert”

When to add

249 The “add” form is used:

- (a) when adding material at the end of the Bill; or
- (b) when adding material at the end of (and as part of) an existing unit in the Bill.

250 When amending text that an amending Bill proposes to include in a Principal Act, the choice between “add” and “insert” is made by reference to the proposed text that appears *in the Bill*. For example, if the Bill proposes to add a Division at the end of an existing Part of a Principal Act, an amendment to include an additional new Division will use the “insert” form. On the other hand, an amendment to include another Subdivision at the end of the proposed new Division would use the “add” form.

251 The “add” form is never used for definitions.

252 Material is added *at the end of the next higher unit* of which it will become part. If the material is to be included at the end of the Bill, but it is not to become part of a higher unit in the Bill, then it is added “at the end of the Bill”.

253 The “add” form always includes “at the end of”.

Examples of adding

(~) Page 99 (after line 20), at the end of the Bill, add:

[To add a Chapter at the end of the Bill.]

(~) Page 99 (after line 20), at the end of Chapter 3, add:

[To add a Part at the end of the last Chapter in the Bill.]

(~) Schedule 3, page 70 (after line 20), at the end of the Schedule, add:

[To add a Part at the end of a Schedule.]

(~) Schedule 3, page 70 (after line 20), at the end of Part 3, add:

[To add a Division at the end of a Part of a Schedule.]

(~) Schedule 3, item 12, page 70 (after line 20), at the end of Part 3, add:

[To add a Division at the end of a Part that is proposed to be inserted in a Principal Act.]

When to insert

254 The “insert” form applies whenever the “add” form does not apply. The “insert” form always includes “before” or “after”.

Examples of inserting

- (~) Page 12 (after line 20), after Part 3, insert:

[To insert a new Part 3A between existing Parts 3 and 4.]

- (~) Schedule 3, item 12, page 70 (after line 20), after Division 2, insert:

[To insert an additional Division after a Division that is proposed to be inserted in, or added to, an existing Part of a Principal Act.]

Order of phrases when “adding”

255 The standard form is “at the end of ..., add ...”.

Use of “the following [unit]”

256 The forms for inserting, adding or substituting text do *not* use the words “the following:” or “the following [unit]:”.

Special forms for amendments involving tables

257 The lines of a table are not numbered. Since the standard forms rely heavily on page/line description, they need to be modified for amendments involving tables.

258 All amendments of tables will use the first model (because a table will always be part of a primary unit).

259 The page number specifies the page(s) where the amendment is to be made. The line number reference is replaced by a description that is sufficiently precise to identify the affected part of the table. The description is in parentheses, for consistency with the line number description that it replaces. When inserting or adding rows, the words in parentheses include “before”, “after” or “at the end of”.

Examples of amendments of tables

- (~) Clause 6, page 3 (table), omit the table.

[In this example, the whole table is on page 3.]

- (~) Clause 6, pages 3 and 4 (table), omit the table.

[In this example, the table starts on page 3 and ends on page 4.]

- (~) Clause 6, page 4 (at the end of the table), add:

[In this example, the table ends on page 4. There is no need to specify the starting page.]

- (~) Schedule 3, item 777, page 13 (table item 3), omit the table item.

[In this example, the whole of table item 3 is on page 13.]

- (~) Schedule 3, item 777, page 13 (after table item 3), insert:

[In this example, table item 3 ends on page 13. There is no need to specify the starting page.]

- (~) Schedule 3, item 777, page 13 (table item 3, column 5), omit “dog”, substitute “cat”.

[In this example, “dog” is in table item 3 on page 13 and the columns are numbered.]

- (~) Schedule 3, item 777, page 13 (cell at table item 3, column 5), omit the cell, substitute:

[In this example, the columns are numbered.]

260 If a table occurs at the end of a text unit (e.g. a section) that is to be omitted or replaced, it will be possible to specify the starting line number but not the ending line number. The standard form will therefore need to be modified.

Example of amendment where text ends with a table

- (~) Schedule 2, item 777, page 70 (starting at line 5), omit section 12, substitute:

261 If it is necessary to refer to a column of a table in an amendment and the columns in the table are not numbered, the column must be identified in the same way as in an amending Bill (e.g. column headed “Decision”). Ordinal numbers must not be used to describe the column.

262 If the table to be amended is on the same page as one or more other tables or parts of tables, include a reference to the section or other provision that contains the table to be amended.

Example of amendment where there are 2 or more tables on the page

- (~) Schedule 2, item 777, page 7 (table item 1 in section 5), omit “\$301”, substitute “\$321”.

Margins for tables, formulas, diagrams and other graphics

263 The page margins for Parliamentary amendments are set for A4 paper size. However, to avoid problems arising when the Parliamentary amendments are incorporated in Bills:

- (a) any table (or table item) must fit within the B5 left and right margins used in Bills; and
- (b) any formula, diagram or similar graphic must fit on a single page within the B5 margins used in a Bill.

Amendments that insert or add 2 or more clauses, Subdivisions etc.

264 Separate amendments must be used in the following cases, even where the units are consecutive, or related in subject matter:

- (a) to insert 2 or more clauses into the body of the Bill, where those clauses are not grouped into a single Subdivision, Division, Part or Chapter (however, an amendment may insert an amending item that inserts 2 or more sections into a principal Act);

- (b) to insert 2 or more Subdivisions, Divisions, Parts or Chapters into the body of the Bill or into a Schedule to a Bill (where those Subdivisions etc. are not being inserted into a Principal Act);
- (c) to insert 2 or more Schedules into a Bill;
- (d) to add, rather than insert, in any of the above cases;
- (e) to omit 2 or more Schedules from a Bill.

265 For Schedules other than amending Schedules, a single amendment may be used to insert or add a series of consecutive clauses or other units.

Examples of inserting consecutive clauses by separate amendments

- (~) Page 99 (after line 15), after clause 66, insert:

[For the first amendment in the group, the line number is specified.]

[This example adds a new clause 66A.]

- (~) Page 99, after proposed clause 66A, insert:

[For the remaining amendments in the group, the line number is not specified.]

Examples of adding consecutive clauses by separate amendments

- (~) Page 99 (after line 15), at the end of Part 3, add:

[This example adds a new clause 66A.]

- (~) Page 99, at the end of Part 3 (after proposed clause 66A), add:

[This example adds a new clause 66B.]

Inserting or adding consecutive items in an amending Schedule

Amendments moved in the House of Representatives

266 Officers of the House of Representatives have advised that, in that House, the Standing Orders limit the extent to which a single Parliamentary amendment can insert or add a series of consecutive amending items.

267 House of Representatives Standing Order 149(d)(iii) deals with debate on Schedules in amending Bills. It states that “items within a schedule shall be considered in their numerical order, and consecutive items which amend the same section of an Act shall be considered together, unless the House otherwise orders” (as at 11 October 2012).

268 This paragraph is taken to prevent a single Parliamentary amendment from inserting or adding amending Schedule items that amend more than one section.

269 Consecutive amending items are inserted in an amending Schedule like this:

(~) Schedule 1, page 6 (after line 14), after item 18, insert:

18A Subsection 42(1)

Omit etc.

18B After subsection 42(1A)

Insert:

etc.

[topic 1; topic 2]

(~) Schedule 1, page 6, after proposed item 18B, insert:

18C Section 43

Repeal the section.

[topic 3]

270 Consecutive amending items are added at the end of an amending Schedule like this:

(~) Schedule 6, page 50 (after line 26), at the end of the Schedule, add:

15 After subparagraph 37(1)(b)(iii)

Insert:

etc.

[topic 4]

(~) Schedule 6, page 50, at the end of the Schedule, add (after proposed item 15):

16 After section 52

Insert:

etc.

[topic 5]

271 In similar vein, separate Parliamentary amendments are used if 2 or more sections are added at the end of an existing Division. (In this case, the second and subsequent new sections are expressed (in the relevant item heading) to be added at the end of the Division “after proposed section ...”.)

272 The following units are inserted or added by a single Parliamentary amendment:

- (a) an entire new amending Schedule (amending one or more sections);
- (b) an entire new Part or Division of an amending Schedule;
- (c) an entire new Chapter, Part, Division, Subdivision or Schedule of an Act being amended.

273 Use separate Parliamentary amendments to insert or add any of the following new units:

- (a) consecutive new amending Schedules;

- (b) consecutive new Parts or Divisions of amending Schedules;
- (c) consecutive new Chapters, Parts, Divisions, Subdivisions or Schedules of an Act being amended.

274 Multiple amendment formats provided for in Chapter 1 of this manual cannot be used in Parliamentary amendments in the House of Representatives, unless all of the amendments grouped together in the one amending item are amendments of the same section. This rule also applies to multiple amendments to change asterisking.

Amendments moved in the Senate

275 In the Senate, a single amendment to an amending Schedule may be used to insert or add a series of consecutive amending items. There is no requirement to divide the amendments as is the practice in the House of Representatives. The amendments set out in the examples above as items 18A to 18C would be as follows if they were Senate amendments:

(~) Schedule 1, page 6 (after line 14), after item 18, insert:

18A Subsection 42(1)

Omit etc.

18B After subsection 42(1A)

Insert:

etc.

18C Section 43

Repeal the section.

[topic 1; topic 2; topic 3]

276 A single amendment may also be used to insert or add a series of consecutive Parts, Divisions or amending Schedules.

277 Senate requests for amendments should be drafted in the same form as ordinary Senate amendments, even though the requested amendments are ultimately made as House of Representatives amendments if they are accepted.

Order of amendments

278 Parliamentary amendments should follow the order of the provisions being amended. This principle applies even though Standing Orders may require a different order of consideration of the provisions of the Bill (for example, requiring the title to be considered last).

Decentralised tables of contents

279 If you are drafting Parliamentary amendments of a Bill that affect the accuracy of decentralised tables of contents in the Bill, Parliamentary officers will update the tables.

Notes about topic covered

Rules to be applied strictly

280 The purpose of inserting notes about topics covered is to facilitate consideration of Parliamentary amendments during debate in the Parliament. However, to ensure that the preparation of these notes does not absorb a disproportionate amount of drafting resources on a continuing basis, the rules have been kept simple.

281 This means that there will be individual cases in which notes prepared according to the following rules will not in fact be particularly helpful to those engaged in consideration of the amendments concerned. In such cases, drafters should simply apply the rules and insert the information required by those rules. Drafters should *not* attempt to devise more useful versions of the note to deal with individual cases.

Topic covered

282 At the end of each amendment, a note should be added describing the topic involved. The topic description should relate to the contents or purpose of the Parliamentary amendment, not the affected provision of the Act or the amending provision in the Bill. The note is to help members of Parliament and Parliamentary officers to identify all amendments that, because they are essential to the implementation of the same change, need to be considered together in the course of debate. For example, an amendment allowing applications to be made and an amendment limiting the kinds of people who can apply should be given the same topic description; and an amendment inserting a new Schedule and an amendment providing for the commencement of the new Schedule should be given the same topic description.

283 The description of the topic should be brief (no more than a few words). For example, “applications”, “contracts” etc. This should be done for every amendment drafted, even if at the time of drafting there is, and is likely to be, only one amendment covered by the particular topic description.

Examples

(~) Clause 23, page 12 (line 3), omit “to the other party”, substitute “to each party”.
[contracts]

(~) Clause 15, page 25 (line 3), omit “43(1)”, substitute “43A(1)”.
[technical correction]

284 If an amendment requires reference to more than one topic (because it should be taken into account when consideration is being given to more than one group of amendments), each topic should be included in the note, separated by a semicolon.

Example of note referring to more than one topic

(~) Clause 45, page 18 (lines 6 and 7), omit “refund the principal within 2 weeks”, substitute “pay the principal and interest within 3 weeks”.
[debts; time limits]

Amendments of Parliamentary amendments

285 Amendments of Parliamentary amendments are generally rare. Some examples are in Appendix 2B. The examples deal with the cases where amendments of Parliamentary amendments are most likely to be required. While the examples are a useful starting point, you should discuss the proposed approach with First Parliamentary Counsel and then seek advice from the relevant Clerk (or from a senior member of his or her staff) if amendments of Parliamentary amendments are required.

286 Minor textual errors in Parliamentary amendments may be able to be corrected with a Clerk's or Chairman's amendment (see Drafting Direction 4.7).

Division of Bills

287 The standard and preferable approach to the division of a Bill before the Parliament is to prepare Parliamentary amendments that excise provisions from the Bill, and introduce a new Bill that contains the excised provisions. This approach uses established procedures.

288 If a Bill is before the Senate, it is theoretically possible to use the alternative approach set out in Senate Standing Order 150, which provides that “an instruction may be given to a committee to divide a bill into 2 or more bills...”. The alternative approach is rarely used. Some examples are set out in the Senate Journals mentioned in *Odgers' Australian Senate Practice* (13th ed, pp 310-313). The Senate Journals can be accessed on the Senate Publications page on the Parliament House website. While the examples are a useful starting point, you should seek advice from the Clerk of the Senate (or from a senior member of his or her staff) if the alternative approach is adopted.

289 If a Bill originated in the House of Representatives, it is likely that the House of Representatives will object to the division of the Bill in the Senate using the alternative approach. *House of Representatives Practice* (6th ed, pp 462-463) states that “it is considered that the established rules and practices of the Houses provide ample opportunity for the consideration and amendment of bills by each House and that the division of a bill in the House in which the bill did not originate is highly undesirable”. If a Bill originated in the House of Representatives, and it is proposed to divide the Bill in the Senate using the alternative approach, you should consult the Clerk of the House of Representatives (or a senior member of his or her staff).

290 If it is proposed to divide a Bill (whether using the standard approach or the alternative approach), you should inform First Parliamentary Counsel of the proposal.

- (~) Division 2, clauses 31 to 50, page 99 (line 15) to page 100 (line 20), omit the Division. [, substitute:]

[topic]

[*SENATE: If there is no substitution, use “to be opposed” instead of “omit the Division”.*]

- (~) Subdivision B, clauses 31 to 50, page 99 (line 15) to page 100 (line 20), omit the Subdivision. [, substitute:]

[topic]

[*SENATE: If there is no substitution, use “to be opposed” instead of “omit the Subdivision”.*]

[SENATE: If there is no substitution, use “to be opposed” instead of “omit the clauses”.]
